e must emphasize how racial equity can be seeded throughout our work in order to build resilient, just communities. While land connects us all, it has also historically been used to separate us. Entire communities of people – especially people of color – have been intentionally displaced and excluded. That shared history of inequity means that collectively our conservation work does not benefit all people as we intend it to.

For more than a decade, we have understood this fact and focused on increasing the racial diversity within the conservation sector through the Diversity in Conservation Internship Program. Our work has not only connected many young people of color with a professional conservation network, it has also helped organizations understand their own role in promoting race equity in their culture and practice.

While CTNC is proud of the strides made over the past decade, our work must expand beyond the scope of one project or program to honor the stories of black, indigenous and other people of color who have felt the loss of access to productive land for living, farming and for preserving their heritage. We must holistically incorporate equity and inclusion into our entire mission and work.

## **Climate Solutions Emerge from the Land**

onserving climate resilient land can restore natural protections for entire communities. The effects of climate change and extreme weather events will continue to impact North Carolina from the highest peaks of the Blue Ridge Parkway to the low-lying lands of Princeville and throughout Eastern NC. When entire communities are at risk, we no longer have the luxury of ignoring this simple fact: our climate is changing.

CTNC is calling for more rational and community-led approaches to rebuilding disaster impacted communities in ways that ready its people for future climate impacts where solutions benefit those who have been most impacted by climate catastrophes – communities of color and those with limited economic resources.

Our commitment to delivering climate-resilient conservation strategies remains critical. Many of the special places we've conserved already offer climate solutions by storing carbon, provide places for wildlife to move as temperatures rise, and provide pristine places that attract millions in recreation and tourism dollars annually. And soon, we will acquire another 240 acres of forested land at the headwaters of the Yadkin River that provides a source of clean drinking water to hundreds of thousands of residents. 


## Where Climate + Community + Equity Align

TNC will collaborate with local leaders and nonprofit partners to create positive change within Princeville, North Carolina. Princeville's land and people have experienced two 100-year floods in the last 17 years. The damage caused, and community members displaced, serve as a reminder of racism and inequality that permeates the heritage of North Carolina land and stretches back to Princeville's founding more than 130 years ago. We must deliver land conservation in ways that honor the past of Princeville while strengthening its future because each time the water rises in Princeville, it meets a courageous group of people that call the land "home."

Together, we can conserve land that restores some of the natural floodplain of the region to help absorb water during future flood events. Through the Common Ground collaborative with funding from Duke Energy Foundation and Z. Smith Reynolds, Conservation Trust will partner with the NC Community Development Initiative and The Conservation Fund to work alongside the Town of Princeville and its people to plan for and ultimately deliver smart land conservation. We promise to work beside and behind our Princeville neighbors with respect, humility and a willingness to learn.
